It was often dyed red to make the longship look fearsome. prow front part of a ship gunwale the upper edge of the side of a boat oarports the holes on the side of the ship that hold the oars figurehead a carved figure on the front (bow) of a boat rigging the ropes used to support and work the masts, yards, sails, etc., on a ship. The masts of Viking longships were made from a single tree trunk. Yard. The pole from which the sail hangs. Halyard rope for raising yard. The yard was hauled up when at sea, so the sail could catch the wind. Square sail. Sails were sometimes quilted in stripes or a diamond pattern, or dyed blood red. Oars
